Happy 30th birthday, and many more!



## Additional MCC Boston Staff




The Rev. Patrick S. Cheng joined MCC Boston as Staff Clergy on January 1, 2002. Rev. Patrick currently serves as the email list manager of the UFMCC Queer Asian Fellowship; he most recently served as Assistant Pastor for Congregational Life at MCC New York. Rev. Patrick is a graduate of Union Theological Seminary (New York), Harvard Law School, and Yale College. He has been published in the theological journal Semeia, and is pursuing doctoral studies in systematic theology at Union Theological Seminary under the supervision of Dr. James H. Cone.



The Reverend George McDermott is retired clergy in UFMCC. He has pastored churches in Providence, Rhode Island and Indianapolis, Indiana. He now serves as pastoral support to the parish extension, MCC Cape Cod Community of Faith.

Rev. McDermott is also a professor at Quinsigamond Community College in Worcester, Massachusetts.

#### **HISTORY of MCC Boston**

Founded on September 10, 1972, the Metropolitan Community Church (MCC) of Boston was one of the first communities of faith in the Boston area to affirm the full membership and worth of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered (LGBT) people. MCC Boston's message of God's love for all—regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity—is just as vital in the twenty-first century as it was three decades ago.

#### **Timeline**

The Metropolitan Community Church of Boston is one of the oldest continuing MCC congregations. At the time of MCC Boston's founding, the denomination was only four years old, with the first MCC having been founded in Los Angeles in California on October 6, 1968. Only one MCC in the northeast US is older—MCC New York, which was founded earlier in 1972.

MCC Boston had its origins in a rap group that began in July 1972, and then gathered together as an MCC mission congregation in September Originally meeting in a living room, MCC Boston soon outgrew its space and moved to the Hunnewell Chapel at Arlington Street Church. After a year and a half, the congregation moved to rent space at the Old West Church (United Methodist), where it still meets. MCC Boston was officially chartered as an MCC church in February 1973. articles of incorporation Commonwealth of Massachusetts were signed in April 1973 congregation's officers: The Rev. Larry Bernier (now priest on staff at St. Aelred's Chapel in San Bernardino, California), Dr. Richard Wattson (since deceased), and James Michael Hayes (currently the church's Alternate Lay Delegate).



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#### MCC Boston History, Continued ...

The founding pastor, the Rev. Larry Bernier, was of both Roman Catholic and Jehovah's Witness backgrounds, and is best known throughout MCC as author of the hymn "Our God Is Like An Eagle." The Rev. Elder Nancy Wilson, then a firstyear student at Boston University's School of Theology, attended the second service and became associate pastor for the church's first two years. She tells the story of how she came to MCC Boston in her book Amazing Grace (co-edited with the Rev. Malcolm Boyd), and shares some of her early ministry adventures in Boston in this book and in her book Our Tribe. Rev. Wilson left Boston to found a congregation Worcester in Morningstar Community Church), and the Rev. Jeffrey Pulling became assistant pastor. Rev. Pulling (now pastor of MCC in the Valley in North Hollywood, California) is also among the church's founding members, having come to MCC

Boston two weeks after it started in September 1972. Then a second-year student at Andover-Newton Theological School, Rev. Pulling was "the first openly gay student at Andover Newton—not the first gay student, mind you, but the first one to open about it."

In the early 1970s, the excitement that MCC Boston generated led to the founding of several other congregations in New England: Worcester, Hartford, Providence, and Haverhill. In addition to the Rev. Elder Nancy Wilson, among the trailblazers in this work was Christa Herrick, then student clergy. Rev. Wilson was also the first to champion the cause of inclusive language in worship and church life. Now an important part of MCC ministry, the practice of using inclusive language was pioneered in the Boston congregation.

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
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#### MCC Boston History, Continued ...

Rev. Bernier and Rev. Pulling left MCC Boston in 1975, and the congregation called the Rev. Ed Hougen as its pastor. Rev. Hougen brought a strong political consciousness to the church and helped continue its work in the movement for inclusive language in the denomination. Rev. Hougen's last year of ministry followed an experimental model: the congregation shared in ministry responsibilities and the pastor's salary was donated to community organizations. In 1981-2, MCC Boston returned to a less radical model of leadership under the pastorate of the Rev. Marge Ragona (now retired from MCC ministry, Alabama), Birmingham, who had previously served as student clergy while attending the Boston University School of Theology.

MCC Boston's next pastor was the Rev. Steve Carson, who was with MCC Boston for five years, building the congregation from about a dozen faithful worshipers to nearly 60 every Sunday. Rev. Carson, together with student clergy Ellen Davis, the Rev. Justin Tanis, and Nancy Voights, helped MCC Boston's women's community evolve into a vital, growing ministry during the late 1980s. Carson moved to San Francisco in May 1990 to return to teaching. The Rev. Dr. Justin Tanis (before his transition), served as student clergy while at Harvard Divinity School and served as interim pastor during the year following Rev. Carson's departure. Rev. Tanis now serves as the denomination's Director of Clergy Development, at the MCC World Center in West Hollywood, California.

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

#### MCC Boston History, Continued ...

The next minister, the Rev. Timothy Koch, came from within the ranks of the congregation. Rev. Koch was a Methodist and minister Boston University graduate student who had been attending MCC Boston during the interim period after Rev. Carson left. Koch helped lay down the fundamentals for building committed, continuing lay leadership and involvement. In addition, he led the church as they paid off an enormous debt that had been incurred during the 1980s. Rev. Koch left MCC Boston in the fall of 1995, and now pastors in North Carolina.

MCC Boston's current pastor, the Rev. Joan Saniuk, began ministry at the church on September 15, 1997. During the past five years, the clergy staff has grown to include the Rev. George S. McDermott (retired), who serves as pastoral support of the parish extension, the MCC Cape Cod Community of Faith. Formed at an organizing meeting on the Cape in August 1999, the Cape Cod community worships twice monthly (at First Parish in Brewster), and celebrating its third anniversary with a first-ever public worship service in Provincetown. The Rev. Patrick S. Cheng also joined MCC Boston as clergy on staff in January 2001.

Today, MCC Boston is a multi-ethnic congregation, including straight allies and family as well as LGBT members. Its membership comes from not only Boston, but also from beyond the city, including the larger Southern New England area. It continues to be an inclusive Christian spiritual community, as well as a center of advocacy and a place of healing for those who have been condemned, barred, or shunned by other churches.

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




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# Reflections on Icon Through the Ages

Who is Jesus—and what does it mean to call him "Christ?"

Icon Through the Ages explores this central mystery of the Christian faith. In the foreground of the painting is the crucified form of the very real, very human, Jesus of Nazareth. It presents the part of Jesus' story that is essentially undisputed: he was a Jewish carpenter turned itinerant religious teacher. He was arrested and executed as a domestic terrorist by the Roman provincial government of Palestine, somewhere around 27 AD.

Behind the image of the crucified Jesus is an image that evokes Michelangelo's *Pietá*—the pale and lifeless body of Jesus, taken off the cross and laid in the arms of his mourning mother. Michelangelo, with other Renaissance artists, had a passion for showing Jesus as a fully human Savior. This image reminds us of the uncomfortable truth that Jesus, though innocent, died a violent death. In this, he shared the experience of oppressed people throughout human history.

Yet Jesus' story, for Christians, does not end here. It concludes with the witness of Jesus' disciples that he not only died, but also rose from the dead and returned to Heaven. The background images of Jesus, the Christ, suggest the icons of ancient Christianity: the face on the left bearing a golden halo, the face on the right bearing a halo with red rays. These are images of a heavenly being, not a mere mortal. They are faces of the eternal Christ: Word of God, Holy Wisdom, child of God and child of Mary, in whose life, death, and resurrection God and humankind are reconciled. This Christ is worthy of praise as the Ruler of the universe—who was, and is, and forever will be.

When we read the painting from background to foreground, we trace some of the history of Western Christian thought about Jesus. Revered as God in ancient times, and lifted up as our fully human brother in modern times, Jesus is the place where human and divine meet. In this meeting, we find our salvation and our hope for our own very human, and also very spirit-filled, lives.

Giovanni...said his gift was a direct reaction to the controversy surrounding the 1992 St. Patrick's Day parade... [The artist] watched and read news coverage of the discrimination against the contingent of gay marchers seeking to participate in the public parade. He said he watched in horror as a small group of homophobic onlookers insulted and harangued the gay marchers who were ultimately and reluctantly allowed to march. Giovanni said he was "touched by the dignified stamina of the gay community as it voiced its right to march peacefully." He added that the incident reminded him of the dignity with which Christ faced his own death in the face of utter prejudice.

# ▼ Faith-Based Action for Social Justice

Like many other organizations serving within the LGBT communities, MCC Boston's members and adherents have experienced discrimination, gay-bashing, and the unrelenting death toll of the early years of the HIV/AIDS pandemic. As in other MCC's, the leadership of MCC Boston has responded with faith-based activism for social justice. In the 1970s, the Rev. Edward Hougen was active in demonstrations for LGBT civil rights. In late 1980s, the congregation committed itself to full inclusion of people with HIV and AIDS in the church's activities.

In 1990. following the murder Georgeff congregant George Dorchester's Ronan Park, the Rev. Steve Carson joined gay and lesbian residents of Meeting House Hill, urging the Boston police to treat the incident as a hate crime due to the extreme violence of the assault. The current pastor, the Rev. Joan Saniuk, continues this faith-based justice tradition, serving as co-chair and charter committee member steering Massachusetts' Religious Coalition for the Freedom to Marry.

#### **▼** Affirming Church Practices

Especially in its early years, MCC Boston often played a prophetic role in the wider MCC movement—urging the rest of MCC to live up to its articulated self-understanding as an inclusive—and diversely Christian—church for all people, with a special ministry for gay and lesbian people. In the words of Rev. Jeffrey Pulling:

"Many of the areas that MCC Boston pioneered in now seem pretty tame because they are so widely accepted. But 23–25 years ago these were hard fought battles; I am referring to the equality of women in church life, lay leadership, and ...



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... pastoral ministry; the use of inclusive language in worship and church life, the language that recognized women as well as men and which depicted God as Spirit beyond gender; the use of grape juice in Holy Communion so that recovering alcoholics might freely participate in this sacrament; and exploring the relationship between sexuality and spirituality. All this happened in the first few years of MCC Boston as a congregation."

#### Ministry of All Believers

The "Priesthood of All Believers" has long been a core belief in the MCC Boston congregation. Today, MCC Boston's members conduct:

- a Prison Ministry, corresponding with LGBT people who are incarcerated;
- a vibrant program of eclectic and contemporary worship music, including the Rhythm & Rainbows choir under the direction of Kevin G. Quattlebaum with music minister Beau Kenyon;
- a Visitation Ministry with hospitalized and shut-in congregants;
- an Internet ministry that has seen almost 10,000 hits on the website www.mccboston.org in the past four years.


# How MCC Began...

In 1968, before the Stonewall Riots and the Christopher Street Parades, the Reverend Troy Perry founded Metropolitan Community Church of Los Angeles to serve the spiritual needs of gay and lesbian people. His action was revolutionary—and transformational. For twenty-seven years, Metropolitan Community Churches have stood in the face of adversity serving as a safe haven for those rejected by other religious communities and becoming an essential, life-affirming link in the chain of lesbian and gay identity and affiliation. Local Metropolitan Community churches have been the birthplace of dozens of different gay and lesbian organizations and projects across the world, and have played a vital role in the development of the global gay and lesbian community.

We are now a denomination of 300+ churches all across the world. In cities large and small, these churches frequently play a pivotal role in their communities advocating for justice and fighting homophobia.



## The Reverend Elder Troy D. Perry

Founder & Moderator of the Metropolitan Community Churches

It has not always been an easy journey. In his autobiography, "The Lord is My Shepherd and Knows I'm Gay," Rev. Perry recalls realizing his vocation in Florida at the age of 13 and being licensed as a Baptist minister two years later. Rev. Perry describes in frank, sometimes heartbreaking detail, the discovery and disclosure of his sexual orientation, divorce, estrangement from his wife and children, loss of his license as a minister, a failed suicide attempt, and the "rediscovery" of his vocation and ministry, leading to the founding of UFMCC.

Rev. Perry's ministry and activism have taken many turns during the past 30 years, including positions on a number of boards of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered organizations. In 1978, Rev. Perry was honored by the American Civil Liberties Union Lesbian and Gay Rights Chapter with its Humanitarian Award. He also held a seat on the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations.

The UFMCC founder holds an Honorary Doctorate of Ministry from Samaritan College in Los Angeles for founding MCC and an Honorary Doctorate in Human Services from Sierra University, Santa Monica, California for his work in civil rights, and was lauded by the Gay Press Association with its Humanitarian Award. Rev. Perry has been invited to the White House on *four* occasions:

- in 1977, by President Jimmy Carter to discuss the whole spectrum of g/l/b/t rights.
- in 1993, by President Bill Clinton as a participant in the first White House Conference on AIDS.
- in 1997, invited by President Clinton as a participant in the White House Conference on Hate Crimes.
- in 1997 again, as a guest of President Clinton as an "honoree" at a White House breakfast with President honoring 100 national spiritual leaders in the USA.

It was Rev. Perry who led the movement for MCC's membership in the National Council of churches starting in September 1981. The UFMCC was given Official Observer status to the 7th General Assembly of the World Council of Churches, which was held in Canberra, Australia in February 1991.

Rev. Troy Perry has devoted his life to help others discover the loving and caring God to whom he has committed his life. Rev. Perry also completed a sequel to his first book entitled "Don't Be Afraid Anymore," published by St. Martin's Press. He is contributing editor for the book "Is Gay Good?" and the subject of another book, "Our God Too." While Rev. Perry realizes the oppression still facing gays and lesbians, he stands at the vanguard of the movement, telling his flock—and the rest of the world—"We're Not Afraid Anymore." Rev. Elder Perry resides with his lover of 15 years, Mr. Phillip Ray DeBlieck, in the Silverlake district of Los Angeles, California.



## The Reverend Delores P. Berry

Evangelist & Musician

Rev. Berry answered her call to ministry at the age of 19. She is a former Christian Methodist Episcopal Minister (CME). She began her ministry at the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches in 1975, and transferred here credentials from the CME church in 1976. Rev. Berry was ordained in the UFMCC in 1983. One of her first official positions with UFMCC was as a member of the Fellowship's Evangelistic Team.



In 1978, Rev. Berry was one of the Co-founders of the national Coalition of Black Lesbians and Gays. She assisted in organizing the first Gay and Lesbian "March on Washington" in D.C. and assisted in organizing the first People of Color Gay and Lesbian White House Conference.

Rev. Berry has served as District Coordinator of the Mid-Atlantic District and Assistant Pastor of MCC Baltimore, Maryland. Rev Berry simultaneously pastored Good Samaritan MCC (Norfolk, Virginia) and MCC Peninsula (Newport News, Virginia). During this time, she facilitated the merger of these churches to become New Life MCC, Norfolk, Virginia, and continued as Pastor of New Life after the merger. Rev. Berry's last pastorate was with MCC Portland, Oregon.

Over the years, Rev. Berry has served the Fellowship as a member of the following committees: the Faith, Fellowship, and Order Commission; the Inclusive Language Task Force; the Elders' Task Force on World Church Extension; the Elders' Task Force on Evangelism; the commission on Missiology (Chair); the Board of Ordained Ministries of the Mid-Atlantic District, and five years of service on the Executive Committee of the Department of People of Color.

Rev. Berry has been working as a full-time Evangelist in UFMCC since 1987 and in May 1988 the Mid-Atlantic District designated the Delores P. Berry Evangelistic Ministries as a Special Work of the District. She visits an average of 55 churches each year and began traveling to UFMCC's in Europe in 1992.

In 1992, Rev. Berry was awarded the UFMCC Purple Grass Award for Excellence in Evangelism.

Rev. Berry is currently a member of MCC Baltimore in her hometown of Baltimore, Maryland. 

Fisher has experienced the joys and sorrows of an under resourced church and district, and is committed to finding ways to meet the varying needs of all churches within the Region.

At the Fellowship level, Rev. Fisher has been the Ecumenical Liaison for Canada, Chair of the Women's Secretariat, Vice-Chair of the Board of Ordained Ministries in Eastern Canada, and Student Liaison for Samaritan Education in Canada. Additionally, she has held volunteer positions with numerous organizations in Canada, particularly advocacy groups. She has been published in a number of periodicals ranging from religious journals to gay and lesbian publications.

In addition to her ministry at MCC Boston and (then) MCC Worcester, Rev. Wilson went on to serve as pastor of MCC Detroit and, for sixteen years, as pastor of MCC's founding church, MCC Los She also served as Vice-Angeles. Moderator of the denomination's governing Board of Elders. Rev. Elder Nancy Wilson is co-editor (with the Rev. Malcolm Boyd) of Amazing Grace:

Stories of Lesbian and Gay Faith and author of Our Tribe: Queer Folks, God, Jesus, and the Bible. A mentor to many clergywomen in MCC, Rev. Elder Wilson was a denominational representative in MCC's unsuccessful applications for membership and observer status with the National Council of Churches of Christ, as well as in its successful application for observer status with the World Council of Churches.

The Rev. Laurence G. (Larry) Bernier is recognized throughout MCC as author of the hymn "Our God Is Like An Eagle."


In addition to his ministries in Boston and North Hollywood, the Rev. Jeffrey Pulling has served as Northeast District Coordinator, and is "Pastor Emeritus" of MCC Hartford, Connecticut. The author of numerous resource materials, Rev. Pulling has also represented MCC to the Faith, Fellowship, and Order Commission of the National Council of Churches.

Jean Gralley, who was a member of MCC Boston in the mid-1970s, chronicled events and trends in the worldwide MCC movement through her cartoons, some of which appear elsewhere in this booklet. The Rev. Marge Ragona, at her retirement, had served a long pastorate at Cornerstone MCC in Birmingham, Alabama, where she served as mentor to a new generation of MCC clergy. Former MCC Boston organist, J. Thomas Sopko, (now at the Church of the Advent) wrote the words to the hymn "Once We Were Not a People," widely used and cherished in MCC.

The Rev. Dr. Justin Tanis, who served as interim pastor at MCC Boston, also served churches in Hawaii and San Francisco before becoming MCC's Director of Clergy Development. His doctoral dissertation, published in May 2002 at San Francisco Theological School, won this year's prize as the best student dissertation. The book form of Rev. Tanis' dissertation, on identity and the experience of God in the lives of transgendered people, is scheduled for publication by Pilgrim Press.

#### What we believe

- We affirm that we are called to be an ecumenical and inclusive Christian ministry of the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered community open to all people.
- We believe that God calls us through Scripture, experience and prayers to be a faithful people, embodying God's love.
- We express this love through worship, prayer, education, social advocacy and celebration. In this way, we build and sustain an affirming, giving congregation that fosters healing and spiritual growth.
- We believe strongly in the concept of inclusiveness--that everyone is equal in the eyes of God and a recipient of God's love. Because the wording of much traditional religious worship was developed in ways that perpetuate historic inequities, we have designed our liturgy to reflect our commitment to the equality of all persons.

- Sometimes people get excited, clap, and/or hold hands. You are welcome to do so, and you are welcome to NOT do so if it is not comfortable for you.

- MCC Boston, celebrates an open communion--all who wish to receive are welcome, for we believe Communion is God's gift and not the church's. If you wish to commune with God, you are welcome!

I have encountered several people who, when their pastor discovered somehow that the person was transgendered, were instructed, shamed, and harassed to return to the gender of their birth. The pastors in these instances claimed that gender transformation was against the will of God. And yet, God, as part of a diverse and awesome creation, created these people. When will the church celebrate the goodness of the varieties of life and expression that God created, rather than try to force nature to conform to our categories of gender and sexual orientation?

To be authentic followers of Jesus, we must be willing to step outside the bounds of our comfort and into the realm of God's creation. We must be willing to follow Christ into the places that make us uncomfortable, places that we never imagined going. Jesus himself broke the bounds of gender in his own life and ministry, speaking to and including women and men around him. As a Christian, I look to Jesus and his encounter with someone quite different from himself for a model of how I am to live in this world of differences.

AN EXCERPT FROM "OUR TRIBE" By The Rev. Elder Nancy L. Wilson

Hear a story of our beginnings. Listen to the voice of the Rev. Elder Nancy Wilson.

I told [Claire Randall, the general secretary of the National Council of Churches] about MCC's worldwide ministry, including our predominantly heterosexual churches in Nigeria among the "untouchable" people. Suddenly she became interested. I enjoyed her questions, her interest in UFMCC, her insights, and what felt like her genuine respect and support of a kind. And then I asked the question... I remember that very private moment when I simply asked her, "Why do you think there is so much fear and resistance toward UFMCC?" (Really: Why do they hate us so?) She sighed, looked nowhere in particular, and said, "Well, I guess when you talk about sex and the Bible in the same breath, they just go nuts."

Not an explanation but an excellent description: "They just go nuts."

A few months into my co-pastorate at MCC Boston in 1973, I was consecrating communion. It was a warm summer evening. Suddenly, from the second pew, a man none of us had ever seen before got up, ran to the front of the sanctuary, knocked over the communion elements, punched me in the face, and ran out of the church before anyone could stop him.

They just go nuts.

Hear a story from one who began his ministry here. Hear the words of the Rev. Justin Tanis.


